You could draw a plan of your garden and use a key to show the different features. You could also make a 3D model of your dream garden using a variety of materials (lego, plasticine, boxes...).



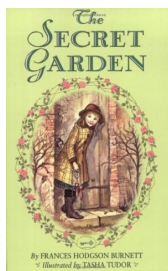
Go on a bug hunt!

What creatures do you think you would find in your garden or local park? Where do you think you would find the most worms? You could investigate where different insects live and create a bar chart or pictogram to show what you have found. You could do some research and create a fact sheet about the different insects, plants or animals you have found.



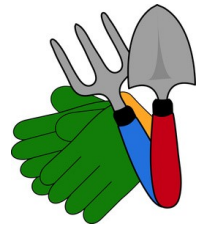
Once upon a time...

We have been learning about 'The Pea and the Princess' and the Queen's allotment. There are many more stories about allotments and gardens. You could find a story about a garden in the library and read it to someone in your family. You could write a book review of a book you have read. You could also write your own story about a garden. What could go wrong in your garden? What adventures could your character have?



Grow your own

We have been investigating what plants need to grow. Use what you have found out to try to grow your own plants. You could plant some seeds, or take care of a plant already in your garden or local area. Keep a diary to show how your plant is growing. You could measure it and record any differences and changes you notice. You could even take photos to show this.



A day in your garden

How does your garden change through the day? What happens in the morning? What about the evening? Go out to your garden at different times of the day to see what is happening. Research which animals that might be using your garden at different times of the day. Are there any animals that visit your garden at night? What clues can you find? Make a note of the time of day and which animals you know or think might be in your garden at that time.
